She is the former Secretary-General of the Namibia National Students Organisation (NANSO) and is a board member of the SADC Youth Forum (SAYOF), as Country Director for Namibia since 2017. She also won the Young Africa Changemaker Award in 2022, a leadership award programme run annually by the PUSH Women Network.

Masua has also recently been appointed to the Africa REACH Leadership Council, a continental initiative that seeks to unify and amplify the strongest political and cultural forces towards ending AIDS in children and youth.
